

# Biographical Notes

**Maurizio AMBROSINI** is Full Professor of Sociology of Migration at the Department of Social and Political Sciences, University of Milan, Italy, where he has furthered the creation of the Laboratory in Immigration, Multiculturalism and Society (LIMeS). His research interests cover immigrants' labour market, irregular migrations, migration policies, refugee studies. He is the author of more than 200 books, articles and essays on these topics.

**Pieter BEVELANDER** is Professor of International Migration and Ethnic Relations at the Department of Global political studies, and Director of Malmö Institute of Studies of Migration, Diversity and Welfare (MIM), Malmö University, Sweden. His main research field is international migration, and he covers different aspects of immigrant integration as well as the reactions of natives towards immigrants and minorities.

**Priska DAPHI** is Professor of Conflict Sociology at Bielefeld University, Germany. Her research focuses on conflicts in the context of globalization and migration with a focus on civil society, contentious politics, and social movements. She currently directs a three-year project funded by the German Research Foundation (DFG) that examines different local reactions to refugees in Germany.

**Elien DIELS** is Research Associate and Ph.D. candidate in Public Administration at the Public Governance Institute, KU Leuven, Belgium. She holds a M.A. in Sociology and a M.A. in Public Management and Public Policy. Her research interests include immigrant integration, public opinion towards asylum seekers and refugees, social policy, multi-level and multi-actor governance.

**Theodoros FOUSKAS** is Adjunct Assistant Professor (407/1980) at the Department of Public Health and Community Health, University of West Attica, Greece. He holds a Ph.D. in Sociology. He has published extensively on issues of migration, precarious employment, access to healthcare, social integration and exclusion. Since 2005, he has participated in many research programs for migrants and refugees and other vulnerable groups.

**András KOVÁTS** is Junior Research Fellow at the Institute for Minority Studies, Centre for Social Sciences, Hungarian Academy of Sciences (MTA TK KI). He is also Director of the Hungarian Association for Migrants (Menedék). His research interests include international migration, immigration and social integration, migration and asylum policies.

**Marco MARTINIELLO** is Research Director at the Belgian National Fund for Scientific Research (FRS- FNRS) and Director of the Centre for Ethnic and Migration Studies (CEDEM), University of Liège, Belgium. He holds a Ph.D. in Sociology. His research and teaching activity are centered around sociology of migration, including topics such as integration, citizenship, equality, class, access to the labour market, and public policy. He is the author of numerous international scholarly works on these topics.

His current research interests include life trajectories and sociocultural adaptation of immigrant newcomers, and psychological processes underlying intergroup and inter-minority solidarity with migrants.
